Patera mat weaving stands at a crossroads between maintaining its rich legacy and adapting to contemporary demands. As one artisan explained, *"I sell Patera to those who don't have their own, making this work equivalent to a job for me."* This statement highlights how weaving, despite its traditional roots, remains an economic necessity for many families. However, modern influences, particularly education and urbanization, are reshaping the aspirations of younger generations. Today's educated youth are often hesitant to continue in their ancestral profession, perceiving it as outdated or less prestigious compared to formal employment. As one weaver poignantly noted, *"Why would an educated person engage in mat weaving? If they do, it will impact the entire craft."* This remark underscores a broader societal shift in values, where traditional occupations are often viewed as inferior to contemporary career paths. This growing tension between tradition and modernity raises crucial questions about the sustainability of Patera mat weaving. Will this century-old craft endure in the face of changing social and economic dynamics? How does education influence the aspirations of younger generations, and can it be leveraged to preserve traditional crafts while also offering new avenues for innovation and economic growth? Addressing these concerns is vital in ensuring the survival and evolution of Patera mat weaving in a rapidly modernizing world.

limited opportunities, and the persistence of traditional practices. Examining their living conditions, income patterns, and societal roles provides a deeper understanding of their aspirations and the obstacles they encounter in their pursuit of socio-economic mobility. Many weavers live in modest conditions, earning a livelihood that, while sustaining their families, often does not provide substantial financial security. Despite their hard work and dedication to their craft, they face difficulties in accessing better opportunities and improving their standard of living. A significant factor shaping the weavers' outlook on the future is education. For them, education represents a crucial tool for breaking the cycle of poverty and ensuring a better future for the next generation. One weaver poignantly expressed, "Children will progress and acquire employment through education. It imparts knowledge of good and bad, making education essential for them." This sentiment reflects a deep-seated belief in the power of education to transform lives by opening doors to stable employment and financial independence. The weavers understand that while their craft has provided sustenance for generations, the evolving socio-economic landscape necessitates new opportunities for their children. Another weaver reinforced this perspective by stating, "Acquiring education is necessary for children's bright future." This statement underscores the aspirations of many mat weavers, who view education as a pathway to upward mobility. They hope their children will not have to endure the same struggles they have faced and instead will be able to build a more secure and prosperous life. By emphasizing the transformative power of education, these weavers illustrate their resilience and determination to secure a better future for the next generation.

Relevance of Education in Socio-Economic Upliftment

This insight underscores how education protects weavers from financial exploitation, enabling them to negotiate better wages and retain greater control over their earnings. Additionally, education enhances weavers' understanding of their own craft. As one weaver shared, "Yes, there is a deep connection. Due to education, we know everything about

Patera, including where it is found and its characteristics. Without education, we would not know anything about it.” This perspective illustrates how education enriches their knowledge about raw materials, production techniques, and market dynamics. These testimonials emphasize the transformative power of education in improving the socio-economic conditions of Patera mat weavers, ensuring a sustainable future for their craft and livelihoods.

Perception of Education as a Tool for Empowerment

This study explores the perceptions of Patera mat weavers regarding education, providing valuable insights into their mindset and aspirations. Interestingly, some weavers believe that education would enable them to transcend their traditional occupation. As one weaver noted, *"It seems that if we educate ourselves, we won't be able to continue this work; we'll do something else."* Another weaver echoed this sentiment, stating, *"Now, if they educate themselves, they'll get a job; what's the benefit of making mats?"* However, others recognize the value of education in enhancing their traditional craft. As a weaver explained, *"Yes, education brings new ideas. Regarding mat weaving, education helps us understand how to utilize our skills effectively."* These diverse perspectives highlight the complex and multifaceted relationship between education and traditional occupations.

Barriers to Achieving Educational Goals enlarge

The pursuit of educational goals is fraught with challenges for Patera mat weavers and their families. This study identifies and investigates the obstacles that hinder their educational aspirations, including financial constraints, social norms, and lack of access to educational resources. One weaver poignantly recounted the difficulties they faced, saying, *"First and foremost, we faced financial challenges, and also struggled with time constraints."* They further elaborated, *"We struggled with financial difficulties for a long time, which is why we couldn't attend school, and we faced numerous challenges. Even when we did attend school, we couldn't focus on our studies, and we struggled to understand the material. These were the challenges we faced."* This narrative highlights the intersectional nature of the barriers faced by Patera mat weavers, underscoring the need for a comprehensive approach to address these challenges and promote educational equity.

Conclusion

This research emphasizes the need for targeted interventions to support Patera mat weavers in their educational journeys. The socio-economic challenges they face require a multifaceted approach that includes financial assistance, access to quality education, and community support programs. By addressing these barriers and fostering opportunities, this study aims to contribute to policy recommendations that could bridge the gap between tradition and transformation for these communities.
